TRASH COLLECTION CHANGE

Beginning October 1, <u>light bulbs</u> will be collected along with other <u>group resource recycling</u> materials, the same category as cardboard, metal, newspaper, and clothing. YOKOSUKA LIVING

The Sesquicentennial

This year is the 150th anniversary of the foundation of the Yokosuka Arsenal, Japan's first modern ship building facility. The creation of the Arsenal impacted not only the history and development of Yokosuka, but all of Japan. Under the guidance of French engineers, the technology and culture developed within the shipyard soon spread throughout the country, jumpstarting Japan's rapid industrialization.

In the latter half of the 19th century, after more than 250 years of relative isolation from the outside world, Japanese leaders found themselves suddenly confronted with the question of how to navigate international relations. One of the first orders of business was to establish a modern military, which meant a powerful navy. The government looked to the French for guidance in this endeavor. French engineer Francois Verny came to Japan and chose Yokosuka as the location to found the Yokosuka Arsenal.

Because of centuries of isolation, Japan lacked the infrastructure to support the construction of modern ships. Thus Verny and his French engineers had to develop the industries necessary to build ships. The Arsenal included brick and rope making facilities, steel processing, a water supply system, engineering schools, and more. Many of these operations were the first of their kind in Japan. Furthermore many of the French and Japanese engineers who cut their teeth at the Yokosuka Arsenal moved



on to become influential figures. The Arsenal also introduced cultural institutions that would be adopted throughout Japan, including the metric system and western bookkeeping techniques.

The Arsenal was founded 150 years ago, but the dry dock built there is still in use by the U.S. Navy today. To celebrate this important historical treasure, the City is holding a variety of events (see page 3), including a bigger than ever Verny-Oguri Ceremony on Nov. 15, a concert, and special historical tours. If you see the number "150" on any notices around the city, chances are it has something to do with the Yokosuka Arsenal.

STOP! IT'S CENSUS TIME!

This year is a national census year. This means that starting in September, government workers will be visiting each home to confirm if residents would like to complete the census online. If so, they will have to complete it between September 10th and 20th.

Should households not complete the census online, government workers will visit again in late September to distribute the paper-based census. For non-Japanese speaking households, the census taker will use multi-lingual forms to communicate and get the necessary information. The forms must be mailed using the provided envelope.

Foreign residents of Japan are also required to complete the census. <u>However</u>, households with <u>SOFA</u> or diplomatic status foreign members are

<u>exempt from the census</u>, even if there are Japanese people living in that household.

All census takers have signed non-disclosure agreements.
