

## MEET YOKOSUKA'S CHILD POLICIES ADVISOR

#### Brief Introduction:

I am Yoshie Komuro. I'm the mother of two young children and the president of a consulting company which helps businesses rethink their work culture. I have been working as Yokosuka's child policies advisor since 2014.

#### What do you like about Yokosuka?

I love the outdoor spaces - the greenery, the sea, the big parks. I also love the fresh seafood (shirasu, yum!), brought in every morning. I always stop at the Port Market.

### Any places you especially recommend for kids?

Yes. I had a fantastic day with my kids on Sarushima

Island. We spent the day BBQing, swimming, and playing volleyball. It was so fun. My kids said that they had never had such a fun day. There are lot of other spots too. There are hiking courses, Soleil Hill out in Nagai, and more. For indoor fun, the Children's Library in Chuo has a great collection of English kids' books!



## YOKOSUKA LIVING

#### New. Old Friends

Prior to coming to Yokosuka, I had never even heard of official domestic friendships, so imagine my excitement at seeing the number of Yokosuka's friendships double during my time here, bringing the grand total to two. The first city, Aizuwakamatsu (often shortened to Aizu), is in Fukushima prefecture. The second is Tomioka in Gunma prefecture. These relationships are based on historical ties, but it's difficult to find information in English about them.

Aizuwakamatsu, a city of about 120,000 people located deep in the mountains of Fukushima prefecture, is famous as a samurai city and for its delicious basashi (raw horse). Its connection with Yokosuka goes back almost a thousand years, beginning when the Miura clan received land in Aizu for its help in a battle. Then, in 1810, Aizu samurai came to the Miura peninsula to guard Tokyo Bay; they brought their families and turned the area into an Aizu territory. Later on, Oguri Kozukenosuke's wife stopped in Aizu during the turbulent end of the Edo Period to give birth to a child. The relationship between the two cities spans many centuries but was formalized in 2005.

Yokosuka's historical connection with Tomioka began in the late nineteenth century and, like most everything that happens in Yokosuka this year, is



related to the Yokosuka Arsenal. Some of the French engineers who developed the Arsenal went to Tomioka to found that city's famous silk mill. The silk mill was enormously important in developing Japan's economy, but it could not have been created without the influence of the Arsenal. Indeed, the buildings of the silk mill were constructed with bricks produced at the Arsenal. The friendship agreement is set to be finalized in November 2015.

The purpose of friendship agreements is to boost local economies. So if you are looking for a new place to visit in Japan, why not check out one of Yokosuka's official friends?
