SENSE ISLAND / LAND 2024

Re-opening for the first time in two years, Sense Island will now also encompass areas throughout the city.









The first "Sense Island - Sarushima Dark Museum" was held in 2019 on the uninhabited island of Sarushima. This event has since been held under the cover and stillness of night with the aim of reawakening visitors' true human senses through artwork installed throughout the island. Last year we did the groundwork with our "Research Events," and now, as this year's Sense Island takes place not just on Sarushima but also throughout the city, the name has been updated to "SENSE ISLAND/LAND." With this new expansion, visitors can also enjoy art during the daytime as well as night.

Yokosuka is where Commodore Perry first arrived in Japan, it played a vital role protecting territory during WWII, and is known nowadays for its blend of American culture. "SENSE ISLAND / LAND" is an experiment that seeks to visualize and recontextualize both time and land through art, by bringing our attention to the "geological strata" of Yokosuka as an accumulation of history, culture, and industry.

Yokosuka is home to Sarushima, the largest uninhabited island in Tokyo Bay; Kannonzaki Park, known for having the first western-style lighthouse in Japan; and Mikasa Park, home to the historical battleship Mikasa, the oldest steel battleship still in existence. In addition to these important historical locations, there are also many culturally significant locations which we are considering for new venues for SENSE ISLAND / LAND, such as streets lined with nostalgic Showa-era shops, and the Yokosuka Museum of Art, designed by 2024 Pritzker Architecture Prize Laureate Riken Yamamoto.

We welcome you to SENSE ISLAND / LAND to experience and enjoy a new side of Yokosuka through art, different from the everyday.



Producer Message

How did Yokosuka come to be the way it is? Why did Commodore Matthew Calbraith Perry arrive in Yokosuka in 1853? Why are there so many tunnels? Why did Yokosuka become a port city with military bases? The answers can be found by unearthing the city's layers and confronting its topography anew.

On the other hand, what power does art created in the region have? Artists have the power to create works that give new meaning to landscapes that are taken for granted.

"Sense Island - Sarushima Dark Museum," began on the dark and uninhabited island of Sarushima in 2019 as an attempt to recover our innate human senses through art. It will expand from Sarushima to areas throughout Yokosuka, extending across time and space, throughout day and night, starting this year, 2024.

"SENSE ISLAND / LAND 2024" aims to use art to re-examine Yokosuka's topography, which has formed over tens of thousands of years, the various industries that have continued over hundreds of years, and the environmental and regional changes that are likely to occur in the near future.

Through "Sense ISLAND/LAND," we hope to draw out the senses that every human possesses to allow you to feel the various sensations accumulated by the topography in various locations throughout Yokosuka.

Guest Curator Message

Just the name Yokosuka brings a variety of imagery to mind, from shipbuilding and naval ports to souvenir sukajan jackets, all of which have been naturally shaped by a complex intertwining of different events. "SENSE ISLAND / LAND" uses geological strata and topography as entry points to redirect our attention to the land on which we stand in order to reveal the area's multiple layers of connection.

This gaze not only helps us learn about the layers of history that have been built up over time, but also leads us to the question of what kind of future we are going to build on this land going forward. By overlaying their works across the landscape and history of Yokosuka, the artists will lead us towards the answers to this question, some in bold strokes, some with a gentle and subtle hand.

We hope that SENSE ISLAND / LAND will reawaken visitors' individual autonomy as well as foster a greater sense of creative collaboration within the local community.

Design Concept

I employed Morse code as a motif under the theme of reawakening one's senses through art and the land of Yokosuka, as Morse code is both sensory and strongly associated with the ocean. The balance between the abstract forms and text changes depending on the distance of the receiver from the information, creating a design system in which the rate of information transmission transforms.
